Message from Pastor Roy

Played out on the stage of creation, autumn is a reminder of the enduring strength of life. At first glance, it appears that everything around us is dying. During the course of the season, leaves fall, plants die or go dormant, animals go into hibernation or prepare for a long cold season of scavenging for survival. Whether by going dormant and emerging in the springtime, or by "sewing" seeds which will grow when warmth returns, plants and animals reveal their strong "will" to live in this season of transition. Each animal and plant quietly holds on to life with patience and stamina. If we mindfully observe creation preparing this season of rest, we too will be filled with restfulness.

At times we find ourselves in seasons of survival, sewing seeds which will carry on our life in future generations of humanity plus the rippling effects we have on all of creation. We sow seeds. At times we are tempted to think that we are the only ones who struggle, but struggle is part of being alive. God moves with us in our struggling and eventual recovery/discovery of peace in the presence of the Ground of all existence.

May we reach out to one another in our seasons of autumn so that none is alone. Each of us carries God's very presence as we visit, as we listen, as we write, as we speak. May we be mindful that we are vessels of God's presence and peace, even when we do not feel that way.

Take courage in the enduring life of the trees, and grass, birds, and other animals which call us to drink deeply of God's gift of life in creation. Thanks be to God, the gracious giver of all good things.

ELIZABETH EATON ELECTED PRESIDING BISHOP OF THE ELCA



The Evangelical Lutheran Church in America on Wednesday (**August 14**) elected the Rev. Elizabeth Eaton as our denomination's fourth presiding bishop. Eaton received 600 votes, and current Presiding Bishop Mark Hanson received 287. She was elected on the fifth ballot.

Eaton currently serves as bishop of the Northeastern Ohio Synod (elected in 2006) and is a native of Cleveland, Ohio. She is married to the Rev. Conrad Selnick, an Episcopal priest and has two daughters. Prior to becoming synod bishop, Eaton served as pastor for ELCA congregations in Ohio, most recently at Messiah Lutheran Church in Ashtabula, Ohio, for 15 years. She earned a Master's of divinity degree from Harvard Divinity School in Cambridge, Mass., and a Bachelor's degree in music education from the College of Wooster in Wooster, Ohio.

"We are a church that is overwhelmingly European in a culture that is increasingly pluralistic. We need to welcome the gifts of those who come from different places, that is a conversation we need to have as a church," Eaton told the assembly shortly after the election.

<u>SUMMARY FROM THE 13TH BIENNIAL CHURCHWIDE ASSEMBLY OF THE EVANGELICAL</u>
<u>LUTHERAN CHURCH IN AMERICA</u> which was held **Aug. 12-17, 2013**, at the David L. Lawrence Convention Center, Pittsburgh, PA. The theme was "Always being made new." **952 voting members were present.**

Elected the Rev. Elizabeth A. Eaton as ELCA presiding bishop

Voting members elected the Rev. Elizabeth A. Eaton, bishop of the ELCA Northeastern Ohio Synod, as ELCA presiding bishop. Eaton will be installed Oct. 5 at Rockefeller Memorial Chapel in Chicago and will begin her six-year term as ELCA presiding bishop Nov. 1.

Elected Wm Chris Boerger as ELCA secretary

Voting members elected the Rev. Wm Chris Boerger as ELCA secretary. Boerger, who recently completed two terms as bishop of the ELCA Northwest Washington Synod, was installed during the assembly's closing worship Aug. 16. He will begin his six-year term as ELCA secretary Nov. 1.

Adopted "The Church and Criminal Justice: Hearing the Cries"

The assembly adopted "The Church and Criminal Justice: Hearing the Cries," a social statement on criminal justice. The statement affirms the fundamental principles of the U.S. criminal justice system, such as due process of law and the presumption of legal innocence, and it also recognizes serious deficiencies -- overly harsh sentencing and persistent inequalities based on race and class. It calls ELCA members to hear the cries of those affected, recommit to visiting the prisoner, correct the flawed criminal justice system and participate in God's work with hands and hearts.

Approved ELCA's first major fundraising campaign

The five-year campaign, to begin in 2014, is designed to increase this church's capacity to renew and start new congregations, educate and develop its leaders, bolster its global mission efforts and expand the impact of its relief and development work. Voting members approved two additional campaign initiatives -- encouraging and forming lay youth and young adult leaders and support for disability ministry. The total campaign goal is \$198 million.

Moved to extend the Book of Faith initiative

Voting members affirmed the Book of Faith Initiative "as a continuing emphasis and priority in this church." The initiative invites the 4-million-member ELCA to become fluent in the first language of our faith -- the language of Scripture -- and to be renewed for lives of witness and service.

Adopted ELCA budget proposals for 2014-2016

The budget for the ELCA churchwide organization includes current fund spending of \$70,541,740 for 2014, \$68,552,280 for 2015 and \$67,920,675 for 2016. It also approved ELCA World Hunger income proposals of \$19,000,000 for each year

2014-2016, and authorized the ELCA Church Council to establish a spending authorization after periodic review of revised income estimates.

Considered proposals from the Memorials Committee

Voting members approved a variety of synodical memorials on topics that include community violence, Israel and Palestine, Holy Communion, immigration reform, pastoral ministry among same-gender couples and their families, the Uniting American Families Act, gender identity discrimination, immigration detention, hydraulic fracturing, fossil fuels and more.

Considered resolutions from the Reference and Counsel committee

The assembly approved resolutions on topics ranging from the 500th anniversary of the Protestant Reformation to a social policy resolution concerning the guarantee of voting rights to all citizens. It also considered amendments to the ELCA Constitution, Bylaws, and Continuing Resolutions on term limit provisions and referred some amendments to the appropriate units of the churchwide organization, Church Council and Conference of Bishops.

The ELCA Churchwide Assembly, the highest legislative authority of this church, will transition from a biennial to triennial schedule with the next assembly meeting August 2016 in New Orleans. LA.

CAMP JOY EL BIBLE RELEASED TIME celebrates its 75th anniversary this fall! The theme this year is from Psalm 24:6 "Such is the generation of those who seek Him, who seek Your face, God of Jacob." According to state law children may, with the permission of their parents, be excused from class for one hour each week for Christian instruction. We are blessed in the Wellsville area to have housed this program at Grace Church for about 25 years. Our desire is to connect and ignite with children in grades 3 through 5 for one hour each week. Children walk from the elementary school to Grace and have about 45 minutes of learning a Bible story, memorizing Bible verses, singing God's praises and they are then walked back to school. Children are blessed by having an adult who listens to them and where they know they are valued in a safe environment. The children are in a place they can safely ask spiritual questions and receive an answer. "The National Council on Crime and Delinquency did a study on Released time classes and found that 4th and 5th graders involved in the program performed better than their classmates. Released Time students improved after one year in three categories of literacy skills: comprehension, spelling and vocabulary. If you have a student in this age bracket, please consider sending them to Released Time. A permission slip will soon be coming home for your signature. If you know an adult who would be willing to devote two hours each Thursday, please have them contact Sue Deardorff 292-1170. If your students are in other elementary schools, please contact the school office as most of the elementary schools in the area have a program.

John and Marianne Weaver have performed pieces for flute and organ for many years and in many different venues both here and abroad. Dr. Weaver is the former Director of Music at Madison Avenue Presbyterian Church in New York City, former Head of the Organ Departments at the Curtis Institute of Music in Philadelphia and The Juilliard School, and a former faculty member of Westminster Choir College, Union Theological Seminary and The Manhattan School of Music.

Marianne Weaver graduated from the University of Wisconsin, Milwaukee, and the Manhattan School of Music. She has played with numerous ensembles including the

American Wind Symphony Orchestra, the Long Island Philharmonic, the Canterbury Chorale Orchestra, Musica Sacra and several light opera groups. She has also had a successful teaching career in New York City.

His musical collaborations with his wife have inspired Weaver to compose music for flute and organ, and two of these works have been published: "Rhapsody for Flute and Organ" and "Dialogues for Flute and Organ". The latter was composed for their performance at St. John's College, Cambridge University as part of the International Congress of Organists held in Cambridge, England in 1987. FREE.
